Content of Seminar:

This online event, organized by professionals with the support of the McKenna Academy, explores the phenomenon of psychosis among psychedelic users based on perspectives from clinical, indigenous, spiritual, and natural philosophy foundations. It highlights the importance of approaching psychosis through various lenses to address it as a public health issue, especially in the context of the growing global use of psychedelics in psychotherapy, trauma counseling, and spiritual practices. The seminar offers valuable Continuing Education Units (CEUs) for clinicians and will contribute to psychedelic-assisted therapy training programs. It features a panel of experts—researchers, clinicians, counselors, and indigenous practitioners—who will present a case study to examine the care of individuals experiencing psychosis associated with the use of psychedelics. The event includes individual presentations, a panel discussion, small group activities, a Q&A portion, and pre-recorded interviews, providing a comprehensive learning experience to expand discussions among professionals and the general public across many different areas of interest.

This presentation does not include an ethics component, nor will there be a focus on supervision.

- Acquire techniques for grounding and stabilizing clients during challenging experiences
- Develop strategies for long-term integration of psychedelic insights
- Explore frameworks for bridging clinical and traditional approaches to mental health
- Learn communication strategies for discussing altered states across different paradigms
- Examine ethical considerations in cross-cultural psychedelic work
- Analyze real-world case studies to apply multidisciplinary perspectives
- Identify key factors contributing to prolonged altered states

- Develop comprehensive treatment plans for complex cases involving psychedelic-induced psychosis or spiritual emergencies
- Participate in creative expression activities to deepen understanding of the subject matter
- Engage in guided discussions and Q&A sessions with expert presenters
- Reflect on personal and professional experiences related to psychedelic-induced altered states
- Explore future directions for research and practice in this emerging field
